Dear People of Saint Anne:

I know that many are still processing the loss that Father Bernie's untimely passing has visited upon all of us. This is only natural. Perhaps some small solace was to be had from the beautiful Funeral Mass that was held on December 6th. Apart from the many words of consolation and praise that were spoken of Father Bernie, I was heartened to hear from the Cardinal afterwards as to how much he appreciated the Saint Anne Parish and its wonderful people. He was impressed at how well we all came together and carried on with our mission, even in the face of such adversity.

The Cardinal was right, of course. The Saint Anne Catholic Community and its mission of inclusive evangelization is larger than any one person. We, as a faith community, will continue to offer worship, foster healing, and act as a bright clarion call for spreading the Good News for many years to come.

None of this happens on its own, of course. There are large and sophisticated operations that support our mission. Most importantly, the sustained generosity of our Parishioners makes all of this possible. You are the faithful, the ones who hear the call and upon whom we, and all those who benefit from your contributions, count on to keep Saint Anne operating in top form. For that, and for the countless other ways our parishioners selflessly live the lives of servant discipleship, we are profoundly grateful.

You are all stakeholders in this Parish. As such, you have every right to expect regular reporting as to how your Parish is performing – both as to spiritual and temporal matters. Today, we carry-on with our mission, and present to you the attached financial and "State of the Parish" reports, for the year ended June 30, 2023.

Father Bernie was closer to the operational aspects of our Parish during this period than I. Nevertheless, I have made an effort to become well informed on these matters with the help of our Director of Operations, Margaret Buckstaff. I am learning quickly, and, based on my discussions, I have confidence in the accuracy of these materials.

I would ask you to read the following report carefully. It provides an excellent synopsis of the vibrant and growing offerings and opportunities at our Parish.

Now, I would like to devote the remainder of this letter to my observations as to the financial performance of the Saint Anne Catholic Community for the fiscal year 2022-23 and the outlook for this current year, which I offer to you in close consultation with Mrs. Buckstaff.

To begin, I would characterize the 2022-23 fiscal year as having ended fairly well, all things considered. On the one hand, this was our first fiscal year in quite a while where our operations were not impaired by government imposed COVID restrictions. On the other hand, we also were not financially buoyed by the significant windfall of government sponsored PPP funds (all of which have since been forgiven).

As you review the year-end financials, you will notice that we missed our budgetary targets in aggregate, by a relatively low amount – less than \$94,000, which is a \$77,000 improvement over last year.

For this year's report, we have broken out into more detail the financial performance of the various major ministries that comprise the Saint Anne Catholic Community. I am most pleased by the performance of our Blue-Ribbon school – as this year marks the lowest level of required Parish supplementary funding to the school's financial operations in several years – less than \$220,000 in all. That is a fully \$130,000 better performance at our school than the year prior, and it continues the trend of improving

performance as parents re-discover the great blessing that a Catholic education can bestow on their children. We are all grateful to our dedicated educators and school families for ensuring our next generation of Catholics are so well grounded.

My gratitude also extends to Margaret Buckstaff and her team for their excellent expense management. Of course, expenses increased year-over-year; that is to be expected, especially in uncommonly inflationary times. But even so, those increases were kept manageable, and did not overly impact our aggregate results. Although we finished marginally in the red, still, we exited FY22-23 in a relatively good position and with decent liquidity of over \$600,000 in our cash reserves.

However, not all is good news. Top line ordinary revenue from weekly and special collections were essentially flat to very slightly down compared to the prior year. That is never a good sign, but it can become particularly worrisome when the economy at large is experiencing inflation of 6% or more.

What caused the shortfall? Reasonable minds can differ, of course, and the global economic uncertainty is clearly one impediment. Another area of concern is the lagging "return to the church" for regular, in-person, Sunday services. Head counts, though increasing, have not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels for Sundays; and it is quite clear that regular Mass attendance and regular giving are correlated.

To that end, looking forward into the current year, please accept my encouragement, and please encourage your Saint Anne friends and neighbors, to come back to our church. Apart from the obvious financial benefits, we miss them and need their voices in our weekly worship. If your circumstances have made regular Mass attendance more of a challenge for you, please consider giving electronically – either through the Give Central weekly, automated giving portal or as a one-time gift. Our new Saint Anne website makes such giving extremely easy to do.

On a related note, it has been several years – well before the pandemic – when last we requested our parishioners to prayerfully consider whether an increase in regular giving is something your circumstances would permit. However, we need to do so again. Expenses are increasing every day, and although we have done a good job in managing those increases and stewarding our resources, it is imprudent and unrealistic to assume we will be able to hold off higher and much more impactful, operational costs in the future. So please, if you have the ability to do so, consider increasing your regular giving. And if you cannot do so just now, please know that you will always have our profound gratitude for everything that you can do – it all helps.

So yes, we all have concerns that might give us pause: an uncertain economy, an environment of challenge and change, the passing of a beloved leader. But as I look out over our parish, I am struck even more so by our enormous blessings, our impressive accomplishments, and our tremendous opportunities for an ever-brightening future. I am confident that together, as faithful, servant-disciples of the Lord, the people of Saint Anne will continue to succeed and accomplish all good things in His name.

Parish Finance Council

The Parish Finance Council (PFC) works closely with the Pastor, who is accountable to the people of Saint Anne and the Bishop for the administration and stewardship of the temporal goods of the parish. The Pastor, according to Canon Law, has among his responsibilities the supervision of parish financial and temporal management. The PFC advises and collaborates with the Pastor and the Director of Operations to ensure that these guidlelines are met. Full consultation is at the heart of Saint Anne's financial decision-making process. The full sharing of financial information, developing the preview of the annual parish budget and the sharing of wisdom regarding the financial operation of the parish are keys to the work of the PFC. Terms on this leadership body are generally two-to-four years and may be extended.



FAITH FORMATION AND EDUCATION

One of the cornerstones of our faith community is our commitment to Lifelong Faith Formation

LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION

Participants of all ages engage in exploring our Catholic faith and God's word; learning to live out our gospel values through prayer and reflection, Mass participation, sacraments, and service within and beyond our faith community.

Catholic Traditions and Beliefs

Guided by their parents, the children of Saint Anne learned our Catholic traditions and beliefs, understanding how Jesus asks us to live, love, and serve one another.

- 313 children (grades 1-8) and their families participated in a variety of formation opportunities and sacrament preparation in small groups at home as families, and at Saint Anne as a community.
- Our middle school Journey program helped 59 teens grow in their relationship with God through small faith groups and service.

Welcoming New Catholics into the Church

At last year's Easter Vigil, through the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA), the Saint Anne community welcomed nine adults into the Catholic faith. Of those, two men received all three Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) and seven other adults, received the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist.

Adult Faith Formation & Other Sacraments

With the help of many talented staff and volunteers:

- Over 30 women participated in scripture study groups
- Nearly 70 adults participated in video and discussion groups for The CHOSEN and "Jesus, the Forgiving Victim"
- Dan Schutte led Saint Anne's Lenten parish mission, "From Ashes to Glory." He took parishioners on a journey through reflections, stories, and music.
- 28 weddings were celebrated
- 79 funerals











FAITH FORMATION AND EDUCATION

YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

Saint Anne Youth Ministry strives to meet teens where they are in their faith and walk alongside them as they journey closer to Christ. We do this through a variety of programs and ministries and with the invaluable support of many dedicated adult volunteers.



PATHS (PEOPLE AFTER THE HOLY SPIRIT) is a two-year Confirmation program serving primarily high school freshmen and sophomores Participants (about 140 teens and 22 adults) met in both small home groups and large groups here at Saint Anne. Year 2 teens attended a Confirmation Retreat called Spiritus.



catholic Heart Workcamp is a week-long summer mission trip for teens going into 9th grade through their senior year in high school. The mission is to revitalize communities and beautify homes for the elderly, disabled and those who cannot afford needed repairs This experience will empower participants through serving. In the summer of 2023, the group included 18 teens and five adults to serve in Louisville, Kentucky.



KAIROS is a 4-day/3-night transformative retreat filled with community, shared stories, prayer, and reflection for juniors and seniors in high school. This year, Saint Anne partnered with Holy Family Parish in Inverness to cohost Kairos retreats in November and February, which included 56 teen participants, 20 teen leaders, and 14 adults.



YOUTH GROUP & TEEN CENTER

Saint Anne's Youth Group is a new ministry bringing together high school students to discuss faith topics in a more casual setting. They meet twice a month to discuss issues such as stress in sports/high school/ at home, friendships, and how to live fully in your faith. The group also had monthly "Drop-In Nights" to play games, watch movies and have holiday-themed gatherings.

Also new to Saint Anne is the freshly painted and furnished Teen Center on the lower level of the Parish Center! The teens worked hard to make this space their own, and it is beautiful!

The Human Concerns Commission consists of four ministries: Care Ministries, Faithjustice, Hope Ministries and the Sharing Board.

Care Ministries

Saint Anne's Ministry of Care is for parishioners who are in nursing homes, hospitals, hospice and homebound; Ministry of Care, Bereavement Ministry and Anointing of the Sick.

Ministry of Care is concerned about the spiritual needs of the sick, hospitalized, and homebound of our parish faith community. We are grateful for the 50 parishioners who are trained and commissioned as lay Eucharistic Ministers of Care, who bring Holy Communion to the sick at hospitals, hospice, skilled nursing facilities, assisted living and senior communities in the Barrington area. Ministers of Care also lead Liturgy of the Word Services and offer spiritual support through prayer to those individuals who are homebound.

Bereavement Ministry is dedicated to serving families who have lost a loved one to death. Five parishioners assist the family of the deceased with planning the funeral Mass. They provide spiritual support, prayer, guidance, and resources to family members grieving the loss of a loved one. In addition, 10 parishioners are bereavement servers and assist priests during funeral Masses. During the past year, 79 funerals were held at Saint Anne. Our parish priests also hold Rites of Committal at surrounding funeral homes and cemeteries.

Anointing of the Sick is coordinated under Care Ministries and is administered by our parish priests. This sacrament imparts the life-giving energy of grace to accept and endure sickness or death with faith. Our priests anoint residents of senior communities and homebound parishioners. Also, parishioners may

receive the Sacrament of the Sick after Daily Mass monthly.

Faithjustice and Creation Care

Faithjustice is a committee of 14 parish volunteers, who focus on issues of social justice. Creation Care is a committee of 10 volunteers, who address issues of integral ecology. This past year's accomplishments include:

- Completion of Creation Care mural on the ramp walls of the Saint Anne School gymnasium
- Racial justice presentation by Norval Brown, a black pastor from the Cary United Methodist Church
- Sharing of parishioners' garden bounty on two Giving Gardens Weekends
- Creation Care speaker series on Laudato Si"
- Participation in 2023 Season of Creation
- Screening and discusstion series of The Letter: Laudato Si Film
- Hosting of Barrington Area 2022 CROP Hunger Walk
- Collaboration with Faithbridge in an inter-religious Thanksgiving service
- Almsgiving campaign supporting Catholic Extension's work in the Diocese of El Paso, Texas
- Grateful Gardeners planting of the window box in the reflection garden and grounds on the north side of the Chapel
- Four Fair Trade sales with proceeds supporting Creation Care, Youth Ministry's summer service trip, and advocacy efforts of Catholic Relief Services
- Participation in Catholic Extension's "immersion experience" in Montana on the Flathead and Blackfeet Indian Reservations

HOPE MINISTRIES

Saint Anne supports those in need throughout the greater-Barrington area with food, housing, transportation, utility, and medical support

Giving Hope through Understanding, Care and Compassion

Hope Ministries is comprised of two branches: Project Hope and the House of Hope Resale Shop.

- Last year, the ministry served nearly 33,000, representing an 82% increase in families served.
 And while that number represents some individuals and families who have been served multiple times month-over-month, the increase underscores the difficulty many continue to have in fulfilling the basic need for food and shelter today.
- The success of the ministry is a direct result of more than 200 caring and generous volunteers dedicated and committed to helping others in the community. Their time and talent give Saint Anne Hope Ministries the ability to provide our neighbors in need with the assistance needed to make a difference.



Project Hope

Project Hope provides ministry outreach and assistance to those struggling to ensure basic needs are met.

- Self-select food pantry enables clients to select the food their families will use. Meat, dairy and fresh produce is routinely provided, which is something few food pantries provide. During the summer months, food pantry receives an abundance of freshly picked produce that ministry clients would otherwise not experience.
- Project Hope also operates a mobile food pantry providing food to families within Barrington and Carpentersville School Districts 220 and 300.
 Shelter, transportation, utility and other assistance is also available to qualifying families.

Project Hope also works to extend its outreach by offering gifts and grants to partners also helping those in need. Last year, Project Hope provided gifts and donations to charitable organizations providing food and other support.

Expressing Our Vision

The Sharing Program provides concrete ways of living out our mission by:

- Sharing our faith.
- Building bridges through friendship and understanding.
- Sharing financial resources, food, clothing and ourselves.
- Involving the Parish members more directly in outreach activities.

St. Mary Frances of the Five Wounds

- St. Mary Frances welcomed new pastor, Father Radek Jaszczuk, in 2022. The Sharing Board worked with Fr. Radek to ascertain his parish's needs and expand the relationship between our parishes. Fr. Radek spoke at all Masses at Saint Anne in November 2022.
- The Sharing Board continues to give the majority of its financial support to St. Mary Frances of the Five Wounds – especially its parish school, St. Frances of Rome, due to the continued financial hardships of the parish families and the potential sunsetting of the Tax Credit Scholarship program. A new principal, Phil Jackson, joined St. Frances. His biggest challenges will be staffing and finances.
- The Sharing Board looks forward to reestablishing the Sharing Schools program between Saint Anne Parish School and St. Frances of Rome School students next year.



St. Moses the Black Food Pantry

- The Sharing Board organized a successful food and coat drive in the fall, followed by another successful food drive in the spring. Parishioners generously donated food, as well as warm coats, grocery gift cards, and cash to support the St. Moses the Black Food Pantry. This will be the last year of direct financial support to the food pantry, though the food drives will continue.
- The Sharing Board acknowledges and thanks
 Project Hope, which has supported our sharing
 partner in many ways, including donations of
 food and coats, as well as a grant. Sharing Board
 members continue to distribute food at the pantry
 periodically.





Saint Anne Sharing Tree

- The Sharing Board continued the Advent tradition of the Sharing Tree with great parish-wide support.
 The 2022 collection included generous donations of gift cards for the people in need that are served by the St. Moses the Black Food Pantry, as well as generous donations for tuition assistance for students in need at St. Frances of Rome School.
- Saint Anne Parish School students were involved again this year, hand making the ornaments for the Sharing Tree. Classrooms also adopted 20 families from St. Frances of Rome. The students purchased gifts from wish lists to provide Christmas gifts for these families.

Saint Anne Guys' Group (STAGG) is committed to men's Christian fellowship through spiritual growth, social interaction and service, following the example set by Christ's apostles.

- They organized a Lenten Men's Morning of Reflection. Father Roc O'Connor, a renown Jesuit theologian, spoke about repentance to a group of over 65 men of the parish.

Saint Anne Women's Club

With over 240 members, the Saint Anne Women's Club continues its commitment to further the spiritual, intellectual and social growth of its members, the parish and the community.

Welcome Ministry

Our Welcome Ministry conducted sessions from October through June for everyone new to the parish and wishing to know more about becoming members.
